Board to Balance Athletic Budget First Time Since '25

Eliminates Award of Sweaters
Instead of Restricting
Sport Program

Plans to balance the athletic budget of the Commonwealth were effected Tuesday by the athletic committee when a motion was passed providing that the college monogram be the only award for athletic competition this year. It is estimated that a saving of \$200 will be made, which, with a surplus of approximately \$400 in this year's allotment, is expected to remove a deficit of about \$600 which remains from last year.

If the athletic department breaks even on this year's expenditures and income, or has a little surplus, it will be the first time since 1925 that it will not be carrying a deficit over to another year.

George E. Teter, chairman of the athletic committee, stated that it had been deemed advisable to balance the budget this year if possible because of uncertainty as to economic conditions in the future. The method to be used was selected as least affecting the program of activities which have been planned for the rest of the year.

Movement Not Very Radical

Since the action Tuesday was taken solely to balance the budget, no time was spent in deciding whether or not this measure should estab-

Recording, Publishing of Votes
Considered by Members
Of Commonwealth

Organizations receiving appropriations from the Commonwealth but not governed by a Commonwealth committee may appoint a representative on the committee of committees, according to a motion passed by the executive board at its meeting Tuesday. By this motion, the band and Stock company will have a voice in the making of the budget.

This was the only positive action taken by the board. The question of allowing members of any committee to receive pay for special services for the committee was discussed. Since the board felt that Harvey Uber, a faculty member, should have an opportunity to talk on the motion, action on the question was delayed until the next meeting.

Whether the votes of members of the board on important matters should be recorded and open to the college was introduced by President Boyer. One of the members of the board objected on the grounds that each representative was responsible
